A letter from the President

Dear ISCA Members,

My best wishes to all of you for your health, happiness, and prosperity.

I also hope that your families, friends, and colleagues are well and that your show caves are now open and seeing some respectable visitation. Despite COVID-19 challenges, I am pleased to report that as of June 30th approximately 77% of the worlds show caves had reopened and by now, I'm sure that percentage is considerably higher.

My families show cave, Natural Bridge Caverns in Texas, USA opened May 8th and struggled through our summer season with significant declines in visitation as our region experienced a high number of COVID-19 cases but I'm also happy to report that our September and October business has been good. There is certainly a direct adverse correlation between a rising COVID-19 positivity rate and declining visitation.



I'm pleased that the health and safety protocols we put in place have been highly effective at keeping our employees and guests healthy and safe, while at the same time we have been able to provide a great experience for the people who are choosing to visit us. I hope you have found the COVID-19 resources ISCA has been providing helpful. In this newsletter, you will see the results of the International Show Cave Survey that includes an extensive list of health and safety protocols and what percentage of show caves worldwide are implementing them.

Show caves play an important nature tourism role of sustainable economic development, providing jobs, and helping the economy. We all know this to be true, but the data had never been collected to quantify the significance of the show cave industry on a worldwide basis. That is one of the reasons we conducted the International Show Cave Survey this past summer. Another reason was to determine how the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted show caves, our employees, and the economy. A big thanks to all of you who took the time to complete this very important survey! 
I am very lucky to work in a cave. Thanks to it, I

ISCA show cave survey – Summer 2020

As most of you know, we conducted a study this summer. This was completed for a couple of reasons. The first goal of the project was to establish a baseline for the significance of the show cave industry worldwide and tell the world how show caves contribute to the global economy. This has never been done before and will be incredibly valuable information to have. The second purpose was to find out to what degree the COVID-19 pandemic has negatively impacted show caves, our employees, the economy, and our mission. We had a great response from show caves all over the world -101 caves in total from 20 countries across 6 continents. The survey data represents 1/16 of the world's show caves, which allowed us to draw important conclusions about the industry and show caves worldwide.

Pertaining to the first goal of identifying the significance of the show cave industry, the data showed that in 2019, 144 million people visited show caves worldwide generating an estimated \notin 1.72 billion (\$1.93 billion) of economic benefit. Further, during show caves' 2019 peak season, nearly 70,000 people were employed by the industry with a payroll of almost \notin 700 million (\$786 million). These numbers suggest that show caves offer a vibrant, important contribution to the economy.

Although these statistics paint a nice picture of the health of the show cave industry and its economic benefit, the negative impact of the COVID-19 pandemic has been substantial. As a result of COVID-19, approximately 94% of the show caves in the world closed, and as of June 30, only 77% had reopened. Directly related, in the first half of 2020, show cave visitation worldwide declined 59%, which amounts to a loss of an estimated 42 million visitors. Additionally, visitor spending was down 61% amounting to \in 514 million (\$577 million) of revenue lost. It is also important to note that 13% (5.44 million) of the lost visitation can be attributed to students and school groups. Of extreme importance, 40,000 show cave employees (58%) worldwide were laid off at some point due to COVID-19. Fortunately, 33,300 (83%) of those laid off had been rehired by the end of June. As can be seen here, the negative impact of the pandemic has been significant and extensive. It is important to emphasize that we still do not fully understand the magnitude of COVID-19 on show caves because these data were collected in the middle of the summer, and the pandemic is still ongoing. More research is needed once the pandemic is over to fully capture the effects.

In addition to collecting information on the economic significance of the show cave industry and effects of the pandemic, we also asked show cave managers to report the health and safety protocols their show cave has implemented due to COVID-19. The linked presentation shows a list of these protocols and what percentage of show caves have implemented them. Practices such as enforcing physical distancing, wearing face masks, and increasing sanitization ranked very high. Some of the less likely reported protocols on the list may be useful for caves to consider and to identify ideas for improvement.

Once again, we'd like to thank all of you who helped us complete this project. This information is invaluable and will be used in the future in a variety of ways. Importantly, please utilize this information to your benefit. Share the data with others in the show cave industry and our affiliates. ISCA will be sharing this information with the media via a press release, and we encourage you to share it as well with your local media to create more awareness and support for the show cave industry. Finally, we plan to continue to further analyze the data and follow up with more surveys in the future to provide a more comprehensive assessment of the effects of COVID-19 and the state of the industry over time.

In our last newsletter, ISCA's Second Vice President, Rafael Pagés, chose Heros as the next person to be answering our questions. Our Brazilian and experienced friend has a lot of interesting things to tell us:

Q: When did you first feel interested in the subterranean world?

A: My interest came when I was a teenager, just before I started my university studies. I have an uncle who already frequented the caves at **PETAR**, a state park located less than 100km from my hometown. He started taking me to camp there and then I started to get involved with caves.

Q: How have show caves changes since you first started working in this field?

A: In Brazil, there has been a great evolution on the management of show caves since the early 2000s, just when I started researching. Cave tourism in Brazil is carried out in a very particular way in relation to the majority of show caves in the world due to the fact that most tourist routes are related to speleological and adventure activities. Until the early 2000s, there were many planning and management problems, such as the lack of adequate training and the implementation of impactful visiting practices. These have been modified and professionalized, ensuring greater safety for both the environment and visitors.

Q: When did you establish a first contact with ISCA?

A: When I started my Master's research in 2005, I learned about ISCA for the first time thanks to a Brazilian friend, former President of UIS, José Ayrton Labegalini. Coincidentally, in 2009 I received an invitation from colleague Peter Gazik (Slovakia). I presented a keynote speaker at the 2010 ISCA Congress and I have been involved with ISCA since then.

DID YOU KNOW...

Rafael also holds the Vice Presidency of the Spanish Show Caves Association (ACTE), among other relevant positions. It is our pleasure to have such an important figure in the association! **ACTE's website**

Q: Could you mention some of your current projects?

A: My current research projects are developed in show caves inside State Parks, especially the caves of Diabo and Santana, the most visited in the State of São Paulo. My work focuses on the environmental carrying capacity of the microclimate and the social carrying capacity of crowd perception and satisfaction of visitors.

Q: How have you lived the COVID-19 pandemic?

A: The Covid-19 pandemic highlighted Brazil's political and social fragility. I can say that my family and I are privileged, but that does not reflect the majority of the population of our country. Unfortunately, the central government did not make enough efforts to contain the pandemic and the population itself adopted a negationist attitude towards it. The result was and remains disastrous.

Q: You have written an excellent article about the effect of the pandemic in Brazilian show caves (see page 18). What should show caves do in order to overcome this difficult situation?

A: Ah! Thanks for the positive mention, but the initial merit is from ISCA itself. Our chairman of the Scientific and Technical Committee, colleague Juan José Durán Valsero, as well as his collaborators, drew up the first guidelines. When we had access to the original document here in Brazil, we felt the need to adapt it to the reality of Brazilian show caves. Some tourist cave managers and researchers also felt motivated about it, so we made a collective effort to produce a version which could be implemented to the reality of cave tourism in Brazil. It ended up being published as a digital book thanks to the collaboration of ISCA.

Regarding how show caves are dealing with the pandemic, it is worth remembering that the government is the manager of most of the show caves in Brazil, and only a few are privately managed. This generates different realities and interests, but in the end, tourism service providers in both cases are being harmed the most - with special emphasis on accommodation, restaurants and tourist guides. Local efforts have been made in order to mitigate the effects, including crowdfunding and other cooperative solutions. On the other hand, some caves have already returned to operation, with limited procedures, which will help in order to recover local economy.

Q: Despite the bad news, what positive things may come out from the pandemic?

A: Without doubt, the union between the interested parties! Government technicians, tourism trade, researchers... The performance of these stakeholders before the pandemic was much more diffuse and the problem on a global scale positively forced the union.

Q: Let's see what kind of caverner you are, how many caves have you visited in your life? A: I would never be able to answer this question... Many tens or a few hundred must be the most accurate!


Q: Which is the last cave you have visited? A: Santana cave, at PETAR, for collecting microclimate data in the middle of a pandemic, last July.

Q: Could you mention three caves which left you astonished? A: Are you kidding me? Only three? Can it be three groups of three? The ones I think are most beautiful are the Brazilian Temimina (PETAR), Janelão (Peruaçu National Park) and the Italian Grotta Gigante. The ones that most impressed me

for their different visitation proposals were Postojna (Slovenia), Coves de Sant Josep (Spain) and Eisreisenwelt (Austria). Finally, the three most important ones for my career: Ouro Grosso (PETAR) - the first one I visited -, Lago Azul (Bonito city, Brazil) which was the base of my Master's degree and Santana (PETAR), where I developed methods of tourist carrying capacity in the doctoral thesis.

Q: Who would you like to be interviewed in our next newsletters? What would you like to ask him/her? A: I would like to read the interview of the colleague and member of the ISCA board of directors, Mr. André Querido Jorge Nuno, for whom I ask: What are the main challenges and, consequently, solutions that you are finding, to deal with the consequences of the Covid-19 pandemic?

The IYCK is not only to teach the general public. Caves often do not get the protection they need. Show caves often do not get the respect and support they deserve as economically important members of their communities. The IYCK will teach community leaders that caves and especially show caves are valuable resources to their communities. With your support, the IYCK will create a healthier natural and economic environment for your show cave.



Eisriesenwelt Cave: 100th anniversary!



Eisriesenwelt is located near Salzburg city, Austria – the worldwide famous city of Mozart. The geological situation in the North of the Alps and the special climate circumstances during summer and winter are the most important attributes for the existence of this unique ice cave, which is the largest in the world prepared for touristic visitation.

It had already been discovered by 1879 but, due to the exposed location in the steep slope of the mountain, the cave was not studied in depth again until 1913. The wide dimensions of this cave were discovered after World War I.

Its current length is over 42 km and most of its beauty can be found in its enormous ice formations. The first kilometre is almost completely covered with ice, and stalagmites and stalactites meet as columns from the bottom to the ceiling. The thickest part of the ground ice is more than 20 metres and one of the biggest ice figures has a circumference of 70 metres.

100 years ago, on 26th of September, 1920, the cave was officially opened for touristic tours, which were offered from May to October without interruption. Not even World War II closed it! However, the danger of avalanches and extreme conditions make it impossible to open in winter time.


At the beginning visitors had to hike up for about one kilometre from the nearest valley until they reached the cave entrance. Then, people often spent a whole day in order to visit the cave. They also had to use crampons to climb over the steep ice formations during the visit.

During this century, a road was built in order to take people until the first way up the mountain, and a cable car was then installed to take visitors to the cave, in which they can find perfect stairs and pathways with stainless, steel handrails, restaurants and a visitor centre. In addition to the previous elements, full infrastructure including water and electric supply, sewage disposal, and more were installed over time.

It should be mentioned that the cave is located on state property and it is leased by a private company whose shareholders are descendants of the founding members, who also belonged to the local club of speleology. The **Oedl family** took control of the cave management and the third generation is still in charge of it.

Over 3.000 visitors/day and 170.000 visitors/year enjoyed the cave last year, and more than 8 million (!) people have already been there during summer time since the 1920 opening.

In 2020 Coronavirus also affected **Eisriesenwelt**, which led to the cancelation of a special event with regards to the anniversary. However, a big celebration was prepared on 26th of September 2020, and the cave visit was offered - as a kind of birthday gift - for a historical price of $1 \in !$

Cave Lighting: Baumann Cave

According to a fictitious legend, the cave was discovered and names after its discovery around 1536 by the miner Friedrich Baumann. Baumannshöhle consists of several interconnected cavities and a beautiful onemeter high stalagmite. The largest room is the Goethesaal, with around 2500 m², in which concerts also take place and plays are occasionally performed during the school holidays.

In 2010, Cave Lighting made its first contact with Baumanshöhle management thanks to the Harz cave researchers. In the same year, the first lighting tests were carried out in the show cave and an installation was even implemented in the crystal chamber of the neighboring Hermannshöhle.

After about 6 years and two lighting tests, we visited the **Dechenhöhle** in 2016 together with **Mr. Schult** and Mr. Mende in order to examine the system installed by Cave Lighting. This tour was very helpful, as the Baumannshöhle managers were able to exchange ideas with the managing director of Dechenhöhle, Stefan **Niggemann**, and discovered completely new perspectives in the show cave business.

The actual installation of the new system started in August 2020, the execution will take two and a half months and will be completed by the end of October. The project was realized by Cave Lighting, in cooperation with the local electrical company Jagusch Elektro. A number of five of our specialists transformed the old show cave into a new underground experience. According to the manager, Thomas Schult, the show cave is "no longer recognizable by visitors because the artistic lighting design and intelligent lighting control have changed the cave landscape". Therefore, the cave is now being "re-explored".

Under the direction of Adrian Kondacs, the Cave Lighting Team has succeeded in setting new standards for lighting in underground objects and creating a tremendous natural experience. Thanks to the newly installed lighting system, visitors are no longer be irritated and visits will now be much safer, too.

From November 1st, 2020, cave enthusiasts will discover the technically improved Baumannshöhle by means of an excellent guided tour which includes a large variety of speleothems and 3D images.





Gouffre de Padirac: Culture & Gastronomy 100 metres underground!

A natural cavity with a diameter of 33 meters and a depth of 75 meters that is the beginning of an underground walk and boat ride of 2.2km at 103 meters below the surface of the Earth.

More than 25 million visitors have marvelled at the cave since its discovery by **Édouard-Alfred Martel** in **1889**.

CREATION & BURIAL OF THE "130TH YEARS CUVEE"

To celebrate the 130th anniversary of its discovery, the Gouffre de Padirac has collaborated with **Jean-Luc Baldès** - **Clos Triguedina** wines to create an exceptional vintage: the **130th years cuvee**.

Nearly 500 bottles of this cuvee made from centennial vines (pure

Malbec AOC) were deposited **103 metres underground** on May 12, 2020, at the foot of the incredible hall of the Grand Dôme, where 13°c and 98% humidity reign all year long. The wine will improve in this natural cellar in the centre of the Earth for one year, until spring 2021. An auction of a few magnums will be organized for the benefit of an association, as well as a sale at the Clos Triguedina and at the Gouffre de Padirac delicatessen.



PHOTOGRAPHIC EXHIBITION «EXPLORATIONS AND HIDDEN FACES»

This year, the Gouffre de Padirac extends the visit experience with an exclusive photo exhibition set up 103 metres underground. An installation of backlighted panels offers hidden faces of the Gouffre, whose underground network extends over 40 kilometres of galleries inaccessible to the public. The 10 photographs exhibited, captured during speleological expeditions, reveal the beauty and scope of this mysterious universe. The photographs are taken by **Kadja Bidovec**, **Jean-François Fabriol**, **Peter Gedei**, **Arne Hodalic** and **Christoph Gerigk**, an immense German artist known for his underwater photographs.

He has been to around 30 countries in order to visit some of the most incredible caves in the world. Among some of those expeditions, it is worth mentioning his five visits to Lechuguilla Cave (New Mexico, USA), one of the world's largest caves.

Underground streams, lakes and springs accentuate the cave's natural beauty making it striking. The authenticity of the cave rests in its truly wild beauty, which captivates and makes the visit a memorable experience.


The cave's beauty has been well known since the 19th century. Among many other Montenegrin dignitaries, **Petar II Petrovic-Njegos** and **King Nikola I** paid it great attention. The first written record of the cave was published in 1839, which is deemed as the actual date of discovery, even though it is known that the cave had been discovered much earlier by the villagers of **Lipa Dobrska**. It was **Henry Layard**, an English archeologist, who visited the cave in 1839 and made the first written record.

Lipa cave has many tales which were passed down from one generation to the next. Today, our guides tell them as passionately as they were told in the past. The locals remember

the cave having been used as a source of drinking water by their ancestors, who named some of the springs inside the cave, such as **Iconostasis**, **Gemini**, **Intestines** or **Tongue**, among others.

During his reign, King Nikola I used to bring international officials, who were staying in Montenegro at the time, to visit the cave. Today, we walk in the royal footsteps through millennia-old underground corridors.

Lipa cave also collaborates in many **projects** which can be found here.

Bats need our help!

Experts at **Bat Conservation International** try to ensure the worldwide survival of bats. Almost 200 species are threatened with extinction and they are in need of urgent help.


The Federally endangered Florida **bonneted bat**, the rarest bat in the United States, is in risk of extinction. Right now, one of only two critical areas for Florida bonneted bats in Miami Dade County is under imminent threat of development.

Miami Wilds is a proposed hotel and water park adjacent to Zoo Miami. In its current location, this development project will lead to the irreversible decline, and possible extinction of the second largest population of Florida bonneted bats.

The Miami-Dade Board of County Commissioners are scheduled to vote on leasing this

environmentally sensitive land to developers which will lead to the loss of one of the most important foraging areas for this species of rare bat. A vote right now to lease the land for private development is premature. Any lease approval should be delayed to fully assess the irreversible impacts to florida bonneted bats and to evaluate other sites for Miami Wilds.
